
GOBBLE, GOBBLE!

PUMPKIN PIE
ANNIE SCHMIERER

2 c. sugar.
1 tsp. salt.
1 tsp. cinnamon.
3/4 c. New Orleans molasses.
3 pts. of thick stewed pumpkin.

Sift together the first six ingredients, then add the others. This will make three large pies.

PUMPKIN PIE

3 tbs. sugar.
1 tsp. cinnamon, or
1/2 tsp. nutmeg.
1/4 c. cream or milk.

1 egg beaten separately.
Butter the size of a walnut.
1/4 tsp. salt.
1 c. pumpkin.

Stew pumpkin, dry out and put through colander; cream butter and sugar, add yolk of egg and other ingredients; white last, beaten stiff.

RHUBARB PIE (One Crust)

2 c. stewed rhubarb.
1 c. sugar.

1 egg.
1 tbs. flour.
1 tsp. salt.
2 eggs.

Bake the pie, then put the well-beaten white of egg on top.

SWEET POTATO PUDDING
MARY E. G. LINTON

1 c. mashed sweet potatoes.
1 tbs. butter.
1 tbs. flour.
2 eggs.

3 c. milk.
1 1/4 c. sugar.
1 tsp. salt.
Lemon flavoring.

Add butter to mashed sweet potatoes while hot. Add flour, eggs (yolks and whites beaten together), milk, sugar, salt and flavoring. Bake in crust. This quantity will make two large pies.

On February 20, 2020, our town will mark the 125th anniversary of the incorporation of Riverside as a township (officially separated it from Delran Township), to form a new town in Burlington County.
